Call to Order & Pledge of Allegiance

The meeting was called to order @ 6:02pm, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Kyle Lothian served as moderator for this informational session. **This meeting was a hybrid of in-person and Zoom video.** Participants were in-person unless otherwise noted.

Kyle read through the rules of order for this meeting, which are attached to the end of these minutes as part of the agenda. Copies of this were made available at the sign-in table, as well as copies of the 2024 town report. There will be no debate or changes made to articles at this meeting. Everything being discussed as part of the warning will be on the ballots for voting at the polls on March 4th at the arena from 7am – 7pm. We have two runners on the floor with cordless microphones, please wait for the microphone and state your name for the record. There will be a time limit of two minutes per speaker per ballot item.

Town Report Dedication – Richard Flint spoke and presented the 2024 Town Report Dedication to Mr. David Desorcie. This town and community are extremely blessed to have David and Desorcie’s Market and we appreciate David for all he has done and continues to do. David spoke briefly, thanking the community for their support for him and the store as well.

Vern Brosky III then presented a plaque to Kyle Lothian for his years of service on the Highgate Selectboard. This meeting was Kyle’s last one with us and we thank him for his service.

Review of Town Meeting Day Articles

Article #1 – To elect the following town officers:

- One Cemetery Commissioner – 5-year term
- One Library Trustee – 5-year term
- One Moderator – ensuing year
- One Selectboard Member – 1-year remaining on 3-year term
- One Selectboard Member – 2-year term
- One Selectboard Member – 2-year term
- One Selectboard Member – 3-year term
- One Treasurer – 3-year term

There were no questions on Article #1.

Article #2 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate set the final date of payment for FY2025/2026 property taxes to be Thursday, October 30, 2025, with payments to be received in the town office by 4:00pm?

There were no questions on Article #2.

Article #3 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate advise the Selectboard to allow the legal use of ATVs (All Terrain Vehicles) on all town roads? ATVs must be registered, insured, have a valid VASA (Vermont All Terrain Vehicle Sportsman’s Association) registration sticker affixed, as well as wear approved helmets and seatbelts.

Ray Laroche began by speaking about the article which was petitioned and met the requirements and deadline for the signatures. Ty Choiniere asked if this passes, would the Selectboard still have to write an ordinance. Yes, we currently have an ATV ordinance, but the Selectboard members are the only ones who can edit or create an ordinance. The article is worded as an “advisement” to the Selectboard for this reason. A yes or no vote on this will give the board a pulse of the voters on what they would like to see, but the Selectboard has the final say on any, some, or all roads being opened up to ATVs. We currently have roads open to connect Swanton to Franklin. There were varying opinions in the room about this topic, some showing concerns for liability, some pointing out that roads are open in Swanton and Franklin on either side of us and that those that break the rules will do it anyway. Policing was discussed, as well as stock mufflers being mandated. Ben Lowell shared pictures of various vehicles, all which fall under the ATV umbrella. He feels some are inappropriate to be on our roads, and that the ATV designation is just too broad. Ben would like to see other solutions explored to accommodate the question being asked of the voters, rather than passing an all-inclusive ATV ordinance. Ben also shared some statistics on ATV accidents / fatalities. Ray spoke about the criteria involved with having a VASA sticker. Vern Brosky III spoke about enforcement and his conversations with a F&W warden, noting there are only 42 F&W wardens in the whole state. SAPD took over in Highgate in 2020 and they did a great job with ATV issues, and we have seen great improvement, but there will always be the ones that do what they want, regardless. We now are covered by FCSO. Henry Rainville is less positive about this article because of issues with enforcement. Richard Flint shared his view, and feels that local clubs are helping and making a big difference with self-policing each other, and he wants to see everyone work together. Scott Martin asked about any financial kick back to the town from the VASA stickers. That is something we could look into. VASA has a great reputation, and they are very positive and supportive of riders and riding, they also promote safety. Ray Laroche has done research on other towns in Franklin County and other than Richford, he believes Highgate is the only town without the roads open for ATV traffic. There were questions and discussion about creating a trail system instead of using our roads as a trail system. It was pointed out that we need to use the roads to even get to a potential trail system. ATVs are not allowed on the Rail Trail – snowmobiles are allowed during certain times of the year and with certain weather conditions! Highgate did compromise last year when we opened up a series of our roads to connect Swanton to Franklin and we have not had any significant issues reported to us. There were no further questions on Article #3.

Article #4 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate request the Selectboard to hold the Town Meeting Day Informational meeting within the 30 days preceding Town Meeting Day, as is allowed per statute 17 VSA 2680?

It was decided at the end of the floor meeting last year to hold this informational meeting within the 5-days preceding Town Meeting. That is why this meeting was scheduled for today. That timeline is just too tight to share information with others (read minutes or watch the recording) before voting. We also have a lot of people that vote absentee that did not have access to this information. Statute allows the informational meeting to be held within 30-days preceding town meeting. There were no further questions on Article #4.

Article #5 – As a non-binding advisory opinion: Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate purchase the property located at 5 Gore Road (formerly known as Paws for Thought), owned by Robert & Sheryl Wilkins, as an option for the future home of the Highgate Library and Community Center?

The owners of the property at 5 Gore Road, Robert & Sheryl Wilkins, were present. Sheryl spoke about the property, when it was purchased, and all the improvements made to it. This work included: new wiring and plumbing, insulation, windows, doors, roof, drywall, and more. The space is very big, much bigger than HLCC has now. The space is chopped up into smaller rooms inside because that is what worked for her business at the time, but most of that are non-weight bearing walls, and could be redone to fit any needs for the space. The building is located on the same side of Route 78 as the school and Sheryl feels this is an inexpensive option for the town at a purchase price of \$350,000.00. If we do not need two stories the water could be shut off upstairs. She did point out that the restrooms are not ADA compliant, and a ramp would be needed. It is not her decision to make, but this is far less expensive than a new build option. Kyle added that a comment was made at another public meeting that the Selectboard is looking to purchase this to prevent landlords from coming in and to control what goes in on that corner. This is absolutely false, that was never said or discussed and has never been the goal or intent to control anything. Vern Brosky III shared some information on how the board came to the decision to add this article. It was pointed out that our former Town Administrator had information that Mr. & Mrs. Wilkins would be interested in selling to the town if the town were interested, but that information was never shared with the Selectboard. If it had been, we could have started this process much sooner and had more detailed info to share. That was not the case. We became aware of this possibility in November. The comments about 5 Gore Road not being ADA compliant may be valid, but neither is our current library facility at 17 Mill Hill Road. There was discussion on the library study from back in 2017 with a \$2 million dollar price tag at that time and with inflation at 2025 prices it would be closer to \$3 million for the proposed library and community center on the former Machia property – Village Core property. The CIP has funds in it for library relocation and \$50,000.00 more are proposed within this year's CIP to be voted on next week. At our current rate of saving, plus inflation costs, it could be almost 100 years before we save that much money. It is a compromise to consider 5 Gore Road, and it will also be work. The new Library Steering Committee has been formed to look more into the options. Vern Brosky III stated that the way he sees it we just can't afford a new building. Dianne Laroche asked about the Machia house that has been vacant for many years. There was discussion and questions on whether that should stay or be torn down. Vern has walked through it and it is extremely unsafe and may need to come down. Nothing has been decided. Christine Walton, HLCC Director, spoke that she is not a contractor, but she has a certification in ADA compliance for public libraries, and there would be a need, at a minimum, to level out the floors / doorways, make doorways wheelchair accessible, as well as add railings. All of this would require a proper inspection. Kyle reminded everyone that this will be a non-binding vote because we got the information so late, this is to get a pulse from the voters if they want to pursue this option further. Engineers would need to get involved and quotes done. Rebecca Manning, Chair of the HLCC Trustees, spoke. She acknowledged that some things were said at the December Selectboard meeting that should not have been said. The trustees submitted a letter to the editor in the St. Albans Messenger about a week ago addressing this topic and all their concerns and their issues with the Selectboard. She stated there are too many unknowns to be voting on this. The purchase price of \$350,000.00 was mentioned tonight by the sellers, which is good info to have. Other things to be considered are ADA modifications, traffic patterns, and costs. The Machia house being mentioned as possibly being torn down is the first she has heard of that and thought that would be decided by a vote. Rebecca would like us to look at what we already own. There are grants available that have not been pursued yet. Whatever is decided we need to make sure it will meet our needs for 50-100 years into the future. Our current library is not able to be expanded, and a larger community space has come up time and time again, for example to hold meetings like this one. Our space at the town office is tight with even 30-40 people at a meeting

and parking/traffic pattern is an issue at the town office and library. David Shover asked about the purchase price for 5 Gore Road and if fixing it up to meet our needs is even feasible. Again it was noted that the question is non-binding. It was noted that the neighboring business to the library has always been interested in purchasing it to expand their business. Those funds could be used towards renovations, and we could likely even get more than it is appraised for. A yes vote for article #5 would be just the beginning of a long process to possibly purchase 5 Gore Road. The Selectboard could make this decision without the voters but they are asking for input. Sheryl and Robert Wilkins are willing to wait and see what the voters say prior to listing the property. There was discussion on if there are other interested parties, Sheryl clarified that to date they have not been pursued any other buyers. They would like to see it be owned by the town, but if that doesn't work out they will put it on the market. Rebecca stated it is irresponsible to ask the voters without more info. Vern Brosky III and Rebecca Manning had a little banter going and will just have to agree to disagree on the subject. Ultimately, we all get one vote on March 4th if we would like to pursue this option or not. Richard Noel spoke that the location is good, it has been substantially renovated, the space is huge (more than 3x their current space), even without the upstairs. He sees many possibilities in the space for HLCC to expand at a fraction of the cost of new. There is green space outside and enough in the CIP to purchase it and use proceeds of the sale of our current building to renovate as needed. Richard Noel further pointed out that comments made at the December 6th Selectboard meeting were made by him, not the board. Further, had we gotten information sooner than November this could have gone much differently. Dianne Laroche would like to see the Machia house torn down first, before pursuing anything else. That topic is not for discussion as part of this article. Chris Shepard asked for clarification on what a yes vote means. He is a member of the newly formed Library Steering Committee and has a construction background/business. Rebecca had comments and questions about timelines with a yes or no vote on this. Sheryl and Robert Wilkins don't have a set timeline, they are waiting to see what the town wants to do. At this point she is not interested in selling to anyone outside of the town, she would love to see a library there. There were no further questions on Article #5.

Article #6 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate vote to raise, appropriate, and expend the sum of \$7,423 for the support of the VNA & Hospice of the Southwest Region to provide services to residents of the Town?

Jason Dessureault was present in-person from the VNA to explain their article and request. VNA & Hospice of the Southwest Region replaced Franklin County Home Health Agency in our community. This amount being asked for is the same as we allocated to FCHHA. Being a new entity, they were asked to petition the board, which they did. They submitted enough signatures by the deadline. He spoke to challenges in their field and operating losses, as well as what they do and why they need community support. They will be rebranding to change their name, stay tuned for that. In one year, their visit counts to Highgate exceeded 1,000. Ty Choiniere thanked them for all they do and if they need more help in the future, he recommends they ask. Gilbert Benoit echoed this, and said as we all will face old age we will definitely need their services, we are all going to get there. There were no further questions on Article #6.

Article #7 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate reallocate \$30,000 within the Capital Improvement Plan from the indoor turf/field house line item and move it to the 72" zero turn mower line item?

Richard Noel asked about the purchase price, we don't have that information yet. Ryan Maskell from the Recreation Commission spoke on this article. The turf was put in at the arena (off ice season) years ago and is in rough shape but looking at replacement costs vs. usage, the zero turn is much more important. What we don't use for purchasing will be left for any repairs or other things in that line item. If approved, we will get prices on different makes, and follow the purchasing policy. Hopefully we will purchase something in the spring, if approved to move the

funds in the CIP. Mark Gilbert added that last year we got caught in a predicament with mowing and waiting on parts for weeks. There were no further questions on Article #7.

Article #8 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate appropriate \$590,000 to meet the expenses and liabilities of the Capital Improvement Plan, with an estimated \$590,000 to be raised by taxes?

Ty Choiniere had questions about the original amount of the CIP and what was cut to get it to \$590,000. The original amount was about \$750,000, which was verified by Planning Commission members present, Tom Conley and Scott Bessette. Henry Rainville had further questions on the CIP gird. Shelley directed everyone to page 52 of the town report. Around town projects were also discussed. There were no further questions on Article #8.

Article #9 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate appropriate \$1,153,171 to meet the expenses and liabilities of the Highway Fund, with an estimated \$982,171 to be raised by taxes?

There were no questions on Article #9.

Article #10 – Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate appropriate \$1,600,822 to meet the expenses and liabilities of the General Fund, with an estimated \$710,352 to be raised by taxes?

There were no questions on Article #10.

Article #11 – As a non-binding advisory opinion: Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate contract with AmCare Ambulance Service for all ambulance services, in the amount of \$269,262.97, with such services beginning on July 1, 2025, for a term of three (3) years?

Clem Roger, Director of AmCare was present in-person. He has been serving Franklin County for 35 years. He stated that they have submitted a professional proposal to service Highgate for the next three years, and that AmCare is fully staffed at this time. He opened up the floor for questions. Sue Cota had a list of questions. She asked about the lost contract with Georgia – yes, that is true, it came down to budgeting and the town of Georgia has gone a different route. It had nothing to do with AmCare's performance. Sue also asked about business in New Hampshire and if that was closing on July 1st. Clem responded that the contract in NH was a loss of the 911 portion that the fire department will be doing themselves. Clem doesn't understand how because they only have two medics there, but that is what was decided and because of that they will not be continuing with that contract, which will end in about 45 days. AmCare has 6 ambulances and currently they serve 4 towns – St. Albans City / St. Albans Town / Fairfield / Sheldon. Their Sheldon station is staffed about 90% of the time. There was a time they were short staffed, but not now. Sue questioned the company changing hands a few times, which Clem clarified. Walter Krul owned AmCare for 30+ years and he sold it in 2020 to Butler Medical Transport, and there has been a name change to WLRC Medical. So it has only changed hands one time. Their financial headquarters / parent company is in Baltimore Maryland, but Clem runs AmCare right out of St. Albans Vermont. Sue questioned the number of staff they have, which Clem clarified. They have 37 staff members total with the following qualifications: 16 EMTs / 10 AEMTs / 8 Paramedics / 3 Critical Care Paramedics. Danielle Scott asked about paramedics and if they are on every crew. Not always based on numbers, but they have 8 total, not all are full time, and at least one, probably two are on each shift, but not necessarily on every ambulance. To make that possible, those 8 people would need to work 72-80 hour weeks. Mary Roy asked about use of GPS and used Fortin Road and St. Armand Road as an examples. When AmCare was in town before, Mary stated there was delayed response due to lack of knowledge of our roads. Clem

acknowledged this and said they have learned. Mary spoke to a personal example during AmCare's time in Highgate, where she drove her husband to MVR's bay in Swanton for transport due to delayed response time. AmCare, as well as MVR, have crew members on staff that are not necessarily from the area. Vern Brosky III had questions about transports, which are big money makers for ambulance services and how transports effect the number of ambulances available back here. Clem explained how that generally works. Mutual aid was discussed and how that works. Clem said he does not wait to ask for mutual aid if it is needed. He added that 911 calls do not pay, transports do. If 911 calls paid like they should, they would not have to come to towns for money. That is just standard in the ambulance business and all services provide transports. Mary Roy asked how many times AmCare responded into Highgate for mutual aid in 2024 – Clem answered 65 or 66 times. Vern Brosky (Vern III's father) asked for a repeat on the comments about 911 calls vs. transports and finances, which Clem reiterated. There were no further questions on Article #11.

Article #12 – As a non-binding advisory opinion: Shall the voters of the Town of Highgate contract with Missisquoi Valley Rescue for all ambulance services in the amount of \$268,936.11, with such services beginning on July 1, 2025, for a term of three (3) years?

Several members of MVRs staff were present in-person. Josh Ramsdell spoke on behalf of MVR. He has been with them for 19 years. He introduced their president, Lynn Bilodeau, who has been with MVR for 24 years. In 2024 MVR responded to total of 1,853 calls and 430 of those were in Highgate. MVR has been in business since 1976 formed to serve Swanton and Highgate. Josh stated that beginning in 2021 they began responding to a higher volume of mutual aid calls, which continues to this day. Sue Cota asked how many mutual aid calls MVR responded to for AmCare. In 2024 MVR responded to 182 calls for AmCare, which is 87% of their mutual aid calls. Back in 2021 that number was 50%. Sue asked about membership, to which Josh responded they currently have 28 members. Shelley Laroche asked for a breakdown, like AmCare shared. MVR has: 2 paramedics / 2 paramedics in training / 10 AEMTs / 7 EMTs / 5 VEFRs. He noted that their numbers have changed some since their submission to the town report. Sue asked about the subscription program with MVR and how that works. It is going fairly well, you don't have to pay it, but it's like an insurance plan, any co-pays or if you don't have insurance, if you hold a subscription, you or anyone in your household will have that amount written off. Gilbert Benoit asked about response times. The average response time in Highgate is approximately 7 minutes, which will obviously be more to certain parts of Highgate, but the average is 7 minutes. Vern Brosky III asked about number of ambulances MVR has – they have 3 and they serve two towns, Highgate and Swanton. Vern asked about their policy when they are providing long distance transports, example: to Boston as recently shared on social media. Josh responded that they have 1 or 2 crews in the community. Two trucks on duty usually cover the two towns quite well. Mary Roy asked Josh how MVR would have responded to a situation at her home, referring to an experience she mentioned earlier. Kyle was not comfortable with the direction of the question / conversation and shut it down, as not being relevant to this discussion and article. Angela Carr said her son plays football and she sees MVR at the games. How does that work for coverage in the community when they are at a sporting event. Josh said that 7 days per week there are generally two crews on duty during the daytime, adding that they are present at sporting events for no added charge. Vern Brosky III asked both services – are all their employees subject to random drug testing. Yes from both AmCare and MVR. Zero tolerance.

Kyle reminded everyone we are voting via Australian ballot on all these articles on March 4th at the Highgate Sports Arena from 7am – 7pm. NO FLOOR MEETING.

Ty Choiniere thanked everyone for participating tonight and thanked the town employees for their work on the process being our first year fully Australian ballot (other than COVID years).

Keith Ploof asked if we could hear from the candidates running for Selectboard. This is not a campaign zone, this is an informational meeting on warned articles. Feel free to talk to the candidates on your own if they are here tonight and if you have questions.

Kyle thanked everyone for coming – and don't forget to vote on March 4th. The meeting was adjourned @ 7:39pm.
